The Choir was founded originally in October 1916 by Mr. W. H. Batey as Ashington Male Voice Choir.

He laid the foundations of successful choral singing of a high standard winning many contests and earning a fine reputation for the Choir.

After surviving the 1926 General Strike and the Second World War, the Choir amalgamated in 1956 with the depleted Morpeth and Newbiggin Male Voice Choirs to form Ashington & District Male Voice Choir.

The Choir has entertained audiences across the region and overseas and performs a varied selection of songs. It is appropriate that several numbers are about coal mining as Ashington was once famous as 'the largest coal mining village in the world'.

Surviving the Covid pandemic, which impacted on many community choirs, this traditional male voice choir from Ashington continues to flourish and attract new members.

Strong Anglo-German Partnerships

Long-standing friendships and twinning arrangements have existed between towns in Southeast Northumberland and the North Rhine-Westphalia region in Germany, since the 1950's.

Remscheid was founded in the 12th century and remained a small village until the 19th century. The City of Remscheid is now famous for mechanical engineering and toolmaking.

The partnership with the City evolved from initial youth exchanges dating back to 1950. The first youth officers to take part in and exchange were Mr McGlynn and Mr Nicholson from Ashington and Newbiggin-by-the-Sea.

This led to a partnership agreement being signed in 1978 between the former Wansbeck District Council and the City of Remscheid to seal the many exchanges which had taken place. A strong bond of friendship and close relationships have continued.

Schalksmuhle dates back to 1350 when the farmers of Hulscheid formed a free duchy. The current municipality was formed in 1969-70 when Schalksmuhle merged with Hulscheid and Dahlerbruck. It is important for its electrical industry.

The partnership with the former Wansbeck District Council, originally with the town of Bedlington, was founded in 1970. It was suggested by Klaus Floeren from Iserlohn, who worked in Bedlington, and met his wife, Muriel Binks. When they moved to Schalksmuhle with their son, Rolfe, they suggested the partnership, which has led to many exchanges between the two regions.


Ashington & District Male Voice Choir and The Dahlerbruck Choir

Friendships through Musical Exchanges

26.08.1978 - Ashington Central Hall

Ashington & District Male Voice Choir welcomed the Dahlerbruck and Rotthauser Male Voice Choirs to a joint concert at the Ashington Methodist Central Hall on Saturday, 26th August 1978 at 7.00pm.

Guest artists were Janice Cairns, soprano and Ann Makepeace, accompanist, with David Burleigh, Northumbrian piper.

11 to 18.10.1978 - Visit to Schalksmuhle

Ashington & District Male Voice Choir made their first visit to the Schalksmuhle region of West Germany.

11.10.1980 - Ashington Central Hall

The Joint Concert at Ashington Methodist Central Hall was the highlight of the second visit by The Dahlerbruck Choir. The newly formed mixed choir included members of the male voice choir which had taken part in the 1978 exchanges.

Guest artists included Carol Andrew, soprano and The Morpeth Highland Pipe Band.

23.10.1982 - Visit to Schalksmuhle

As part of their second visit to Schalksmuhle, Ashington & District Male Voice Choir took part in a 'Dorfabend' (Village Evening) at the Willi-Koch-Turnhalle.

They were joined by Fanfarenzug and Gesangverein.

06.10.1985 - Ashington High School

The Joint Concert with The Dahlerbruck Choir at Ashington High School took part during European Music Year.

Shirley Wilkinson, soprano was the guest artist.

01.10.1988 - Visit to Schalksmuhle

During their third visit to Western Germany, Ashington & District Male Voice Choir took part in 'Jubilaumskonzert' (Anniversary Concert) with several local choirs.

The 1984 Coal Miners' Strike

The German city donated substantial sums to the Miners' Hardship Fund in December 1984. Regular food parcels were sent from the local community. The city hosted 45 children for a holiday after the strike ended.

Ashington, in particular, will never forget this support from their German friends.
